


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

# **Antimicrobial Resistance: Point of Care Diagnostics in Human Health**

In an effort to respond to the global priority of AMR as well as to address existing knowledge and funding gaps, CIHR has launched a funding opportunity on point of care diagnostics in human health. The Expression of Interest deadline was May 17, 2016. The grantees will participate, along with industry representatives, in a networking workshop to take place in Ottawa on June 21-22, in an effort to foster collaboration and support the development of full applications. The full application process will involve 2 phases at a later date and will require applicants to have matching (1:1) partner funding (cash or cashequivalent) in order for their application to be eligible.

## **Conference to Develop a Federal Framework on Lyme Disease**

On May 15-17, the Government of Canada held a conference, as mandated by the Federal Framework on Lyme Disease Act, to help inform the development of a framework that will help prevent and reduce Lyme disease-related health risks for Canadians. Open to the public, the conference featured a public forum where people affected by Lyme disease shared their experiences with Lyme Disease from the patient, family and friend, and health care professional perspectives. The Honourable Jane Philpott, Minister of Health, opened the conference, along with the tri-Chairs, Gregory Taylor (Public Health Agency of Canada), Jim Wilson (Canadian Lyme Disease Foundation), and Daniel Gregson

(Association of Medical Microbiology and Infectious Disease Canada). The main plenary addressed prevention, identification, treatment and management of Lyme Disease while the breakout sessions had the objective of discussing topics related to the three areas of the Act such as surveillance, guidelines and best practices, as well as education and awareness. Participants included patients and patient advocacy groups, the medical community, researchers, federal government representatives, and other stakeholders.

## CIHR Launches the SPOR Innovative Clinical Trials Initiative

As part of its commitment to support clinical research and strengthening the environment for clinical trials in Canada, CIHR is launching a new initiative to support the conduct of innovative trials in Canada under Canada's Strategy for Patient-Oriented Research (SPOR). The initiative will fund researchers to develop and/or adopt innovative methods for carrying clinical trials as alternatives to traditional randomized controlled trials. Methods for conducting innovative clinical trials offer the possibility of obtaining reliable results at lower cost than can be achieved by standard randomized controlled trials. They represent an opportunity to lever one of Canada's main health resources including data collected via a universally accessible health care system.

The first funding opportunities under this initiative will provide funding for

- catalyst grants
- multi-year grants, and
- mentorship Chairs (anticipated launch date late July 2016).
